Review: Parable of the Rich Fool

Today, we will learn about the Parable of the Talents. In Bible times, a talent was a large amount of money. A talent of gold was worth about fifteen years of a laborer's wages. In this story, the master gave each servant a different number of talents. He trusted each servant to use the amount he was given to make more money for him. Reveal Bible Story Scripture Reference: Matthew 25:14-30. Pray. Read.

THE WAY BE A GOOD AND FAITHFUL SERVANT

In Bible times, what was a "talent"? (A large amount of money.) How many talents did the first servant receive? (Five.) How many did the second servant receive? (Three.) How many talents did the third servant receive? (One.) The first two men used the talents to make more for their master. The master was pleased with them. What did the master say to them? ("Well done, good and faithful servant.") What would it feel like to hear God say that to you? What did the master invite the two servants to do? ("Come and share your master's happiness.") Imagine God inviting you to come and share in His happiness. When we use the gifts God gives us to build His kingdom, it makes Him very happy. He invites us to share in that happiness with Him.

The first two servants served their master well with what they had been given. What did the third servant do with the talent he was given? (He buried it.) He did not honor his master's trust. The master trusted this servant to use the money to make more money; instead, the servant did nothing with it.

The money from the master was not just a gift. The master trusted each servant to use the money wisely for the master while he was away. What mattered most to the master was not how much his servants were given, but what his servants did with what they were given. What are some gifts God has trusted you with? (Money, treasures, friends, special talents, hobbies, family, strengths, abilities, etc.) How do you think God might want you to care for or use these things to build His kingdom?

If time allows, play WELL DONE game in the GOT TIME? segment.

CHRIST CONNECTION:

In the Parable of the Talents, Jesus taught us that if we are faithful in the little things, God will trust us with bigger things. Check out the way wise King Solomon explained this same truth to God's people hundreds of years before Jesus told this parable. Reveal Proverbs 3:3-4. Read.

How have you been faithful to use what you have been given? God notices when we are loving and faithful to do what He has asked. He sees our hard work. When we use what we are given, God gives us even more, just as the master did in today's parable.
