To spark anticipation, encourage arriving children to meet and greet one another with today's question. **Meet & Greet Question: What is your favorite color in the rainbow?**

GAME: ANIMAL MATCHUPS

Purpose: Children will pair up and "board" the ark to introduce today's story.

Supplies: Note cards, safety cones (or chairs), markers, tape

Prepare: Make a list of animals that make noise such as dog, cat, horse, sheep, bee, bird, rooster, monkey, pig, or snake. Prepare animal name cards for half of the children in your class by writing a different animal name on each note card. Create a matching set. Decide which area of your room will be the "safe zone" or "boat" and use the cones to mark the area.

Teacher's Tip: If you have non-readers in your class, use pictures of animals instead of animal names.

A big flood is coming! We all need to board the boat to be saved from the flood. Be sure to hurry, because you do not want to be left behind. Point out the "boat." However, there is one small thing you must do before you can safely board. You must find out which animal name is taped on your back by asking questions that can be answered with a yes or no. For example, "Do I have four feet?" When you know what animal you are, you must find the other person who has the same animal, but you can only make the sound of the animal to do it. When you find that person, the boat captain will allow you to safely board the boat.

Directions:

- 1. Tape an animal card onto each child's back. Be sure children cannot see the names of the animals they are receiving. If you have an odd number of children, choose one child to be the boat captain and assist in checking animal match-ups before pairs "board" the boat.
- 2. On your signal, each child will try to find out what animal name is taped onto his or her back by asking other players questions that can be answered with a yes or no. Children may not look their own card and the other children cannot say the name of the animal until the child guesses it correctly.
- 3. After a child knows the name of the animal, he or she makes the sound of the animal until the other child with the same animal is found. The pair then races to the boat and to safety. If an incorrect match tries to board the boat, they must return to the game and try again.
- 4. The game is done when all the children have boarded the boat.
- 5. Play again, if time allows.

Long ago, a man named Noah really did have to collect two of every animal and put them on a boat to save them from a flood. We will find out more in today's story.



Teacher Tip: To help children identify time set aside for worship, designate a special corner or area for singing, collecting offering, and watching the worship illustration. Play music as children move to the designated area.

Teacher Tip: This worship time includes an explanation of how Jesus made a way (like a bridge) for whoever believes in Him to no longer be separated from God, the Father. This illustration is called "The Bridge of Salvation" and it includes a personal invitation to receive Christ as Lord and Savior. It is included at the end of the Bible Barn Script or two leaders may present the salvation message using "The Bridge of Salvation" illustration available at ResourceWell.org.

Today, we thank God our Provider for giving us what we need. In today's story, He provided the ark to save Noah from the flood. In our own lives, He provided the cross as a way to save us from punishment for our sin.



As we give our offerings, let's think about the ways God provides for us. Sing: "Trust and Obey" while the offering is collected.

You may also choose to sing songs that focus on Jesus' name, trusting in Jesus, or God's saving power and grace.



God saved Noah because Noah trusted and obeyed. Obeying God by trusting in His Son Jesus is the only way to be saved. We can trust Him to wash away our sins and save us for a life forever close with Him now on earth and later in heaven. Read Psalm 51:1-2.



Sing the Unit 6 Bible Memory Verse Song: "Yahweh Everyday: Trust in the Lord."



Perform Bible Barn script or read storybook: God of Wonders Unit 6, Lesson 29.



Present the salvation message using "The Bridge of Salvation," or invite children who want to come back to God through believing in Jesus to pray the ABC prayer (or a similar prayer of salvation) with you now.

ABC PRAYER (Admit – Believe – Come)


Lord Jesus,

I Admit I am a sinner.

I Believe You are the Lord who died to take my sins away.

Please Come into my heart and I'll follow You forever.

In Jesus name, I pray. Amen.



Teacher Tip: As you move from worship to instruction, change rooms or locations within a room to help redirect the children's focus to the Bible story. During this transition time, have each child write his or her name on a card and place it in the Golden Bowl.

Before we read God's Word, let's go over our Class Covenant. A covenant is an agreement. Just as God made a covenant with His people, I ask each of you to make this covenant promise with me today. Listen as I read our Class Covenant: "I will keep my eyes on my teacher, my mouth in control, my ears on God's Word; knowing God is my goal."

Last time, we read about two of Adam and Eve's children, Cain and Abel, and how Cain was jealous of Abel. How can we be our brother's keeper? (Love and care for others.)

If a Bible Timeline is available, point to Noah (Circa 2350.B.C.). For a Bible Timeline Review activity, see the Got Time? segment of this lesson. Today, we will read how God saved Noah from a worldwide flood. Genesis 8:4 explains that after the flood, when the water dried up, the ark came to rest on the mountains of Ararat. If a map of the Middle East is available, point out Mount Ararat in Eastern Turkey, near Iran and Armenia.



Let's play Find It First! Bring out your Bible; keep it right in front of you. Hand out spare Bibles. Today's Scripture verse is behind the curtain (or secret door, secret window, etc.). Child reveals the Bible Story Scripture reference: Genesis 6:5-9, 14, 19, 22; 7:16-18, 23-24; 8:1, 6-12; 9:13-15. Let's see who can Find Genesis 6:22 First. Ready? Set? Go! Children race to find it first. The winner helps others find it. Let's highlight our Key Verse: Genesis 6:22.


Before we read, let's stand and ask God to open our eyes, ears, hearts, and minds to His Word today. Who would like to pray that for us? Child prays aloud. Be seated.

Listen carefully as we read how God saved Noah. Because this story covers three chapters in the Bible, we will just read portions of it.

Many years after Cain killed his brother Abel, most of the people on the earth were doing wrong in God's eyes. Read Genesis 6:5-9, 14.

God gave Noah instructions on how to build an ark (a huge boat). The ark was to keep him, his family, and the animals safe from the great flood God would send to clean the earth of all the violence. Read Genesis 6:19, 22; 7:16-18, 23-24; 8:1, 6-12.

Noah, his family, and all the animals left the ark as soon as the land was dry. Noah and his family were very thankful God saved them, so they built an altar to worship Him. There, God made a special promise to them and to all of us. Read Genesis 9:13-15.



Additional Supplies: Children's Guide for New Believers (available at ResourceWell.org)

Why was God sad? (Men were very wicked.) Noah lived during a time of wickedness. People were hurting each other, lying, stealing, and killing. What did the Lord see about the hearts of the people at that time? (The thoughts of their hearts were evil all the time.) How does the Bible describe Noah's faith? (A righteous man, blameless among the people, he walked with God.) What does it mean to "walk with God"? (Children respond.) How would you describe your walk with God today? (Children respond.)

In your school or your neighborhood, are there people who mistreat others and do wrong in God's eyes? (Children respond.) What are some of the challenges you might face in walking with God as Noah did? (Children respond.)

Why did God plan to flood the earth? (To rid the earth of all evil.) Why do you think God chose to save Noah? (Children respond.) Noah believed in God. He obeyed all of God's instructions. Even though Noah was a sinner, God chose to save him because Noah trusted and obeyed. What do you think was the most difficult thing God asked Noah to do? (Children respond.) What difficult thing is God asking you to do now? (Children respond.)

What was the first thing Noah did after leaving the ark? (He built an altar and worshiped God.)



Connecting the Old Testament, the New Testament, and Us

CHRIST CONNECTION

There is evil in our world today. While God has promised to not flood the earth, He has also promised that evil will not be allowed to go on forever. The Bible promises that when Jesus returns to judge the earth, He will make all things right and judge everyone according to what they have done. Just as God saved Noah, God has made a way to save us from paying for our sins on the day when Jesus returns. By dying on the cross, Jesus made a way for us to be forgiven for our sins and to have life forever close with God. Over 2300 years after Noah lived a faithful life, Paul teaches us why we are to live that same type of life.



<u>FIND IT FIRST></u> Everyone, place your Bible closed on your lap. Choose a child to reveal the Christ Connection Scripture reference: 1 Thessalonians 5:8-11. Let's see who can Find It First! Ready? Set? Go! Find it and highlight it. Read 1 Thessalonians 5:8-11.

How can this scripture help you walk with God this week? (Children respond.) Jesus said everyone who believes in Him as Lord and Savior will have eternal life and will be raised up on the last day. If any of you are ready to trust Jesus to save you from your sin, you can pray to Him about that right now. If a child wants to know more about accepting Jesus as Lord and Savior, then review the Children's Guide for New Believers and offer to lead that child in the ABC Prayer of Salvation located in The Worship segment or in the Children's Guide for New Believers. Give any child who prayed a prayer of salvation a Children's Guide for New Believers to take home.

THE WAY continued...



Teacher Tip: Write the names of classmates, local church leaders, and children in other nations or others who need prayer on small pieces of paper. Place the papers in a golden bowl.

Revelation 5:8 says our prayers are like sweet smelling incense in the golden bowls at God's throne. I will lift each one of your names to God's throne as you pray for each person silently. Then, we will pray the Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6:9-13) aloud together. Let's pray.

Lord God, we lift up to Your throne the name of each child here. We trust You	u to watch over
us and our needs, the ones we say aloud and the ones hidden in our hearts. I	First, we lift up
to You, Read names in Golden Bowl.	•

Now, we pray the prayer Your Son taught us: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be Your name. Your kingdom come, Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one. For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.



When only 5 minutes remain, begin this segment.

FINAL FIVE MINUTES

<u>TREASURE TREAT</u>: Today, your Treasure Treat is a wooden cross. Let it remind you that just as God made a way for Noah to be saved by a wooden ark, God made a way for us to be saved if we believe in His Son Jesus who died on a wooden cross.

Teacher Tip: The "Rainbow Cross" craft may be used for the Treasure Treat.

<u>W</u>³: Take home today's W³ Journal Entry as your personal devotional study. Keep your journal entries together in a notebook or in your Bible. Distribute W³ Journal Entry #29. Complete this at home and let God speak to you through His own words in the Bible!

<u>OFFERING OF ART</u>: Until it is time to be dismissed, let's make an Offering of Art. For your offering, draw a picture of your favorite part of today's story. The Offering of Art can be finished at home or given as an offering for the teacher to display.

PRAYER REQUESTS: As children work on their Offering of Art, ask how you can pray for them this week. Write requests in a prayer notebook.

BIBLE MEMORY VERSE SONG: Play the Unit 6 Bible Memory Verse Song, "Yahweh Everyday: Trust in the Lord," in the background as children wait to be dismissed.

SNACK: ANIMAL CRACKERS

Purpose: To focus on some of the challenges Noah faced in caring for the animals aboard the ark.

Snack Suggestion: Animal crackers

There are many details in the Bible about God's instructions for building the ark. God gave Noah the instructions, and Noah followed them exactly. Some details of the story are not mentioned, such as how Noah caught and fed the animals he found. As we eat our snack, let's think about all the special meals the animals would have needed on such a long trip.

Directions:

- 1. Serve the snack and drinks.
- 2. Ask a child to pray and thank God for the snack.
- 3. Ask the Snack Discussion Question: What do you think it would have been like living on a boat with that many animals?

GAME: WILL IT FLOAT?

Purpose: To celebrate the floating of Noah's ark.

Supplies: Bucket of water, several floatable and non-floatable items (e.g., wood block, modeling clay, aluminum foil, penny, ruler, crayon, drinking straw, cork, pencil, paper clip, twig, marble)

God told Noah exactly how to build an ark to hold many heavy animals and still float through heavy rains and flooding. To celebrate that Noah's ark stayed afloat, let's play "WILL IT FLOAT?"

Directions:

- 1. Divide the class into two or more teams.
- 2. Place the bucket of water where everyone can see it.
- 3. Show the children an item and ask them to decide as a team whether it will sink or float.
- 4. Drop the item into the bucket.
- 5. Give a point to each team who guessed correctly.
- 6. Repeat steps 3-5 for each item.
- 7. At the end, the team with the most points wins.

GOT TIME? continued...

GAME: FEED THE LION

Purpose: To imagine feeding the hungry animals aboard Noah's ark.

Supplies: Large poster board, three beanbags, sturdy tape (masking tape or duct tape)

Prepare: Draw the outline of a lion on a large poster board. For the mouth, cut a large enough opening

to easily toss a beanbag through it.

Imagine how many hungry animals were inside Noah's ark. In this game, the team that feeds the most beanbags to the hungry lion is the winner.

Directions:

- 1. Hang the poster board from a table with tape so the mouth opening is not obstructed.
- 2. Divide the children into two teams.
- 3. Team members take turns standing behind a designated starting line and tossing 3 bean bags at the lion's mouth. Children get 1 point for each toss through the lion's mouth.
- 4. When everyone has played, the team with the most points, wins.

CRAFT: RAINBOW CROSSES

Purpose: To create a cross to remember God's promise and saving power.

Supplies: Tissue paper or cellophane (red, orange, yellow, green, blue, purple), clear contact (shelf)

paper or laminating sheets, hole punch, yarn, tape, scissors

Prepare: From contact paper, cut a cross shape that is about 6-inches x 8-inches. Cut an 8-inch length

of yarn. Cut the tissue paper or cellophane into small squares.

Teacher Tip: This craft may be substituted for the Treasure Treat.

Today, we discovered God saved Noah from the flood. He promised He would never flood the earth again and gave Noah a special sign. What was it? (A rainbow.) We also learned God saves us from punishment for our sins. Who did He send to do that for us? (Jesus.) Jesus died on the cross to take our punishment. The cross is a sign of God's promise to forgive and save all who believe in Jesus. Let's make a rainbow cross to help us remember God's wonderful promises. You can take it home and hang it in a window to see the rainbow shine in the sunlight.

Directions:

- 1. Peel the paper backing off the cross shape.
- 2. Use loops of tape to secure the non-sticky side to the table.
- 3. Press pieces of the tissue paper or cellophane onto the sticky side of the cross. Encourage children to use every color.
- 4. Trim the tissue paper to fit the shape of the cross as needed.
- 5. Punch a hole in the top of the cross.
- 6. Loop and tie the yarn through the hole to create a hanger.

GOT TIME? continued...

DISCUSSION: ARK BUILDING FACTS

Purpose: To understand the physical details of God's instructions concerning the ark.

Supplies: Bibles

Optional: Divide the children into teams and race to find the correct answers.

God gave Noah specific instructions for the ark's measurements, what it was to look like, and what building materials to use. Noah obeyed every instruction. Open your Bibles to God's instructions in Genesis 6:14-21. Read each question and help children locate the answer in their Bibles.

Questions:

- 1. What type of wood did God tell Noah to use in building the ark? Gen 6:14 (Cypress.)
- 2. Verse 15: How wide was the ark to be? Gen 6:15 (50 cubits/75 feet/about 25 meters.)
- 3. How tall was the ark to be? Gen 6:15 (30 cubits/45 feet/about 15 meters.)
- 4. How long was the ark to be? Gen 6:15 (300 cubits/450 feet/about 150 meters.)
- 5. How many decks did God tell Noah to build inside the ark? Gen 6:16 (3.)
- 6. How many doors did God tell Noah to put on the ark? Gen 6:16 (1.)
- 7. Who did God tell Noah the passengers would be? Gen 6:18-20 (Noah, his wife, his three sons and their wives, two of every bird and land creature.)
- 8. What did God tell Noah to pack? Gen 6:21 (Every kind of food for the people and creatures.)

BIBLE MEMORY VERSE ACTIVITIES

GAME: THE WAVE

Purpose: Children learn the Unit 6 Bible Memory Verse (Proverbs 3:5-6).

Supplies: Unit 6 Bible Memory Verse poster or Bible

Directions:

- 1. Assign one phrase from Proverbs 3:5-6 to each child or group.
- 2. Direct each child or group to quickly stand, say the assigned phrase while raising both hands up to the sky and then down to the thighs, and then sit down.
- 3. Repeat three times, saying the verses faster each time.

GOT TIME? continued...

GAME: YAHWEH—TRUST IN THE LORD

Purpose: Children learn the Unit 6 Bible Memory Verse (Proverbs 3:5-6).

Supplies: Unit 6 Bible Memory Verse Song "Yahweh Everyday: Trust in the Lord," CD player, Unit 6

Bible Memory Verse poster

Prepare: Display the Unit 6 Bible Memory Verse poster. Create a hand jive or dance motions to go with

the verse or plan to have the children help you create motions.

Directions:

- 1. Children stand in a circle.
- 2. Play the Bible Memory Verse Song while children sing along.
- 3. Add a hand jive or dance motions.
- 4. Sing again with the motions. Challenge the children to keep the motions going as the song goes faster and faster.



BIBLE TIMELINE REVIEW

God of Wonders Part Two studies the miracles and stories of the Bible from Genesis through Joshua. Review recent Bible stories to see the continuing story of who God is and what He has done.

<u>Adam and Eve</u>: What did Adam and Eve do that was the first sin in the world? (Adam and Eve disobeyed God by eating from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil.)

<u>Cain and Abel</u>: Why was Cain upset with his brother? (He was jealous of Abel because God accepted his offering.) What did Cain do? (He killed his brother.) What did Cain ask God? ("Am I my brother's keeper?")

<u>Noah (Circa 2350 B.C.)</u> How does the Bible describe Noah? (Righteous, blameless, he walked with God.) How did God save Noah from the flood? (God gave Noah exact directions for how to build an ark that would keep everyone on it safe.) What is your favorite part of this story? (Children respond.)

How to create a Bible Timeline from Genesis through Joshua:

- 1. Print each scroll on sturdy paper.
- 2. Choose a wall or other visible location to display the timeline.
- 3. Before each lesson, add the scroll for that lesson to the Bible Timeline using the list below. Add the two Unit 10 cards for God of Wonders Advent: Lessons 48-52.
- 4. To review the Bible Timeline, ask the corresponding questions as you point to the associated scroll.

<u>Genesis through Joshua</u>: Creation > Adam and Eve > Cain and Abel > Noah (Circa 2350.B.C.) > Tower of Babel > Abram (Circa 2100 B.C.) > Hagar and Ishmael (Circa 2065 B.C.) > Abraham and Isaac (Circa 2050 B.C.) > Isaac and Rebekah > Jacob and Esau (Circa 1900 B.C.) > Joseph (Circa 1850 B.C.) > Moses (Circa 1500 B.C.) > Joshua (Circa 1450 B.C.)
