Letters About Forgiving Others

Lesson Aim: To know God calls us to forgive others as He has forgiven us.

THE WELCOME

MEET & GREET: What is your favorite number?

GAME: Lots of Forgiveness

THE WORSHIP THE SPIRIT WHO GUIDES US

Read Worship Scripture: Matthew 6:14-15

Sing songs and worship God. Bless and collect the offering.

Perform the Mail Call script or read storybook.

THE WORD LETTERS ABOUT FORGIVING OTHERS

Children sign note cards; place in Golden Bowl. Classroom Covenant.

Review: God led Paul and John to write about God's forgiveness of our sin.

Today, we have letters about us forgiving others. We will learn how we are to forgive others, just as God has forgiven us. Jesus says if we do not forgive others, God the Father will not forgive us. Let's see what Paul says about that in letters he wrote to the churches in Corinth and Colosse (or Colossae). Point to ancient Corinth and Colosse. This mailbag reminds us that in Bible times believers traveled long distances to share letters from Paul. Reveal Bible Story Scripture

Reference: Colossians 3:12-13; 1 Corinthians 13:5. Pray. Read.

THE WAY FORGIVE OTHERS

Jesus wants us to forgive. If you met someone who didn't know what it meant to forgive, how would you describe it? Jesus forgives us for the wrong things we have done and the right things we have left undone. Have you ever forgiven someone for something he or she did to you? Have you ever forgiven someone for something he or she would not do for you?

Have you ever heard of holding a grudge against someone? It means staying angry for what he or she has done, instead of truly forgiving. Paul describes it as keeping a record of wrongs. Remove

paper, pebble, and tape from mailbag. Fold paper into an airplane. **This paper airplane stands for your life. Let's think of this pebble as a grudge. When you do not forgive someone, it is as if you are carrying a heavy rock with you wherever you go. Tape pebble onto airplane. Attempt to fly it. When we do not forgive someone, the grudge we hold weighs us down and keeps us from being all God wants us to be. When we hold a grudge, we are hurting ourselves.**

Jesus does not hold grudges and He does not want us to hold grudges. We can avoid carrying a grudge by being kind, gentle, patient, and forgiving. Has forgiving someone ever been very hard for you? If you ask God to help you forgive others, He will do it!

Close your eyes and let's take seven seconds of silence. Ask God to remind you of anyone you have not yet forgiven. Pause for silent prayer. Now, let's ask God to fill us with His Spirit so we can forgive each person that has wronged us, even if they have never said they were sorry. Lead a brief prayer.

CHRIST CONNECTION:

More than 1000 years before Paul wrote to Corinth and Colosse, Jacob's son Joseph forgave his brothers for trying to harm him and selling him into slavery. Reveal Genesis 50:19-21. Read.

It is hard to forgive when someone has hurt us on purpose. It is even harder to then treat that person with kindness. That's what Joseph did. Not only did he forgive his brothers, he reassured them and spoke to them with kindness. Have you ever treated someone with kindness, even though they had hurt you on purpose?

THE GOLDEN BOWL: Pray for individuals. Pray the Lord's Prayer.
